truly an investment in the future that is worth the consideration of every family.

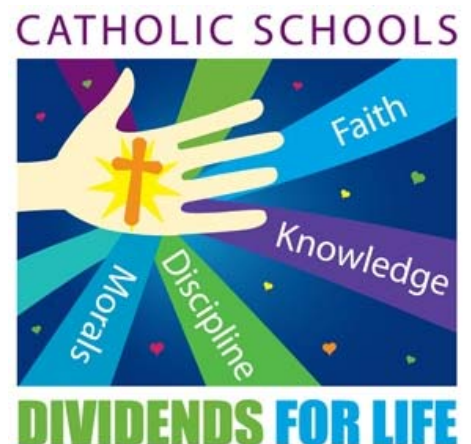

Supported Student Rate for 2010-2011

Hard to believe we are already working on enrollment and budget for next year, but it is true. As you probably already know, there is a significant difference in tuition cost between the supported and the non-supported rates. This has nothing to do with financial need. It is based solely on meeting the criteria listed below in a parish of the Diocese of Manchester for incoming grades one through eight.

Some possible reasons for not getting the supported rate this school year are: your child went to Kindergarten or PreK (which are not supported), you are new to the school, you changed parishes without notifying the school, or you did not meet all three of these criteria:

- Registration in a parish or mission;
- Contributor of record in a parish or mission;
- Active participation in the life of a parish or mission.

If you are currently getting the supported rate and continue to meet the above criteria, you do not have to do anything. Your name will be on the list I submit to your parish priest to confirm your continued eligibility.

If you are not getting the supported rate now and will be meeting the above criteria and you do not get a letter from me in the next couple of weeks, you may either contact me in the office or have the attached Supported Student Form signed by your priest, obtain the parish seal, and return it to the school by March 1, 2010. Forms received after that deadline will not be eligible for a subsidy. Note that this is for parishes in the Diocese of Manchester only.

Please call me if you have any questions. I know that this can be a confusing process.

Dear Parents,

I hope you are enjoying our winter season. I just have a few issues to discuss.

1. Children are still coming to school with fevers. A fever is 100 or higher. Even if your child does not have a fever, but is sick please keep him/her home.
2. I'm seeing a lot of children with chapped lips. Vaseline applied at night and in the morning will help as well as a good lip balm.
3. Dry skin is an issue at this time of the year. The best time to apply lotion is right after a bath or shower when your skin's pores are open to soaking up the lotion. Pat your skin dry and then apply lotion. Look for lotion that is

alcohol free, as alcohol is drying in itself.

4. During this season please make sure your children have extra socks in their backpacks as well as maybe an extra pair of gym pants if it is gym day or if your child wears a bigger size. I bought extra tights and socks at the beginning of the school year, but I am out of them now. We have no extra gym pants or bigger pants so that is a problem. I saw six children on one day that were pretty soaked after recess and I could only clothe four. Please make sure your children come to school properly clothed with jackets, boots, hats and mittens.

School-Parent Collaboration: A Labor of Love

Sometimes, despite interesting school activities, it can be hard to find the energy to become involved in your children's school. After a long day at work, it can be tough to get off the couch or find time among your many other household and parenting duties. It's easy to let the opportunities slip away. It takes time, energy and often money for you to be involved in your children's school activities.

Fortunately, the payoff to getting involved in your children's school is significant. Research shows that parental involvement and collaboration with schools helps children perform better academically. When parents work with schools and school counselors, children get more A's and B's and fewer C's, D's and F's, tend to have greater social adjustment, get along better with other students and teachers, spend less time in the principal's office and more time in the classroom, communicate more effectively, and do homework more willingly.

However, parent-school collaboration requires tenacity because things don't always go perfectly. Your child might be embarrassed to be seen with you, or the teachers or counselor or principal won't recognize you. Both of these possibilities

can leave people feeling disrespected and discouraged. The truth is that there's no guarantee a good time will be had by all. But we'd like to urge you to hang in there. Parent-school collaboration takes time and work. But after all, that's what the word means: to labor together.

As you work with your child's school, something almost magical happens. You get to glimpse the remarkable. You might have to watch closely, but sometimes you get to see learning happening right in front of your eyes. And sometimes, as you sit by your child, you can see her trying just a little harder, and you know she's more determined and confident, just because you're sitting there, in the right place at the right time. Other times, you'll see the sparkle in your son's eye as he gets to show off a little for you. That sparkle makes you proud about getting off the couch and down to your child's school. Your children (or even the school) may not say thanks directly. But if you get involved, you certainly will earn the school's gratitude in the long run for being the kind of parent who cares enough to engage in the labor of love that we call parent-school collaboration.

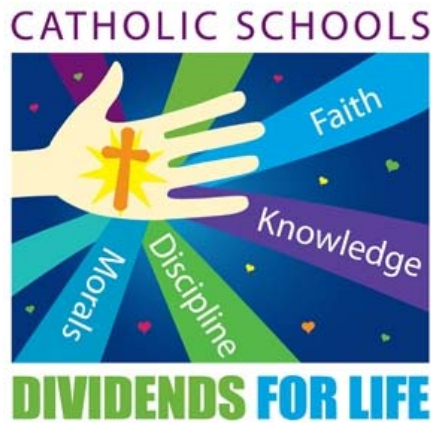

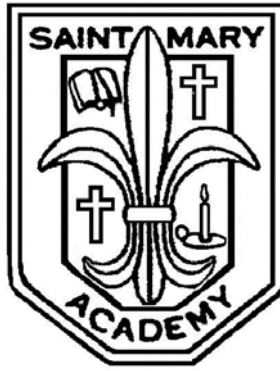
